

Staying alive

At the October Canberra Game Fishing Club monthly meeting, attendees discussed how easy it is to die on the ocean.

So, this Tale Rope article includes some suggestions for staying alive.

At the October meeting, there was mention of a 6 metre trailer boat sitting on the bottom in 80 feet of water at The Peaks, off Sydney, with rods still in the gunwhale rod holders and the rocket launcher.

There are two excellent photographs in the East Coast Tuna and Billfishing group Facebook pages of the sunken boat, and with a bit of searching you can find and read the story of how it sank, written by its skipper.

The comments tell the story of the sinking; start searching them at a post by Robert Main dated September 19.

In short, the boat went down in August 2015 in bad weather, probably after a split in the hull. The skipper did not have time to get his safety gear from the cabin, not even the EPIRB, and when he tried to grab a life jacket out of the cabin it tangled on a rod holder. By the time the skipper got free as the boat vanished into the depths, he was 45 feet underwater and he barely got back to the surface alive.

Skipper and crewman had no lifejackets, choppy seas and strong wind and nothing floated up from the boat to support them apart from an unhelpful tupperware container lid. They survived through luck. Another boat was drifting about 250 metres away, down sea and down wind. They swam towards it shouting as they went. With the breeze behind them, someone on the drifting boat heard them and rescue followed.

If your boat ever sinks and you would like to survive through forethought and planning, rather than depend on luck, read on. And remember that if the bad day comes it will probably happen with blinding speed, often when everything was going along just fine an instant before.

Alan Latimer recalled at the October meeting an incident of years ago when things went wrong so fast that the people on board had no time to send a mayday message. Their 19 foot boat took a wave and capsized. Through luck, a nearby boat with Alan on board spotted heads in the water ("that's not a whale, it's people!!") The rescue boat found people trying to cling to the upturned bow of their boat. From experience, upside down boats are not designed to give useful handholds. In a rough sea, you



would not last long relying on the upturned bow as a refuge.

Readers probably heard in the past year or so about the miracle rescue of a solo trailerboat fisherman who fell overboard with no lifejacket or EPIRB and whose boat travelled onwards for miles. It is also easy to imagine getting off balance while fighting a powerful fish and being pulled overboard. Don't be too proud to have a rope from your waist to a seat base, long enough to move while fighting a fish and short enough to stop you from going overboard.

Consider the lessons from the above incidents and increase your chances of staying alive if the sea tries to claim youu.

Disasters often happen fast. No time for a radio mayday, no time to read the "Lifejackets" sign in the cabin and start pulling up bunk seats to find a lifejacket, no time to reach flares and a floating safety gear container in a cabin either upside down or rapidly filling with water.

If you think it could never happen to you, stroll around the Bermagui headland and count the "Lost at sea" memorial plaques. They thought it would never happen to them, too.

So the first lesson is, the best place for a lifejacket is on you, all the time. Inflatable life jackets are reasonably slim fitting and can be worn constantly provided you do not play with the inflation tab. A couple of years back Frank Tallarida fiddled with the inflation tag harder than was wise. He had a rapid attack of gas and increased his waist line alarmingly.

The second lesson is that EPIRBs and safety packs really truly do need to be within a metre of someone who is well aware of their location, how to free them from any locking system, and fit and quick enough to grab them in an emergency.

A third lesson goes to redundancy. Be as safe as you can with steps one and two above, then throw in other measures as backup.

Of more relevance to trailer boats than flybridge cruisers, a kill switch on the throttle control box (especially if solo fishing) means that if the skipper goes overboard the motor stops. Run a line from the kill switch down the starboard side of the boat with a line to your belt, sliding up and down that first line. If there are two or more on board you might tangle up a bit. Better a few tangles than a boat vanishing under power after people go overboard.

A personal locator GPS beacon can be bought for \$250 to \$350 or so. The full size Emergency Position Indicator Radio Beacon with GPS is even cheaper and if required it will broadcast a "rescue me" message for at least two days; three days with the Kti brand. The personal beacon can be worn on your belt or hung around your neck so that if your best plans about an easily accessible EPIRB do not work out, at least you have a beacon with you that will broadcast to rescuers for at least 24 hours



(Kti brand again).

If you think it unfair that a personal beacon typically costs more than a big EPIRB, consider how much would you pay for one if adrift in the ocean with no boat?

Illustrating the value of a "worn on the body" beacon, a fishing and boat magazine carried the story of three guys in a trailerboat hammering along when an abnormal wave threw the boat into the air. Two men were thrown clear out of the boat. The driver had his body over the side, but retained his grip on the steering wheel and was (just) able to slow the boat and get back on board before picking up his mates. In the water and with the boat disappearing at full throttle, a personal beacon around the neck would be much better than nothing.

There are two technology fixes that can add to your safety.

One is to connect your GPS to your VHF radio via NMEA 0183. Then you have only to flip up a red cover on the radio and press a button. The radio will automatically broadcast a mayday message with your GPS location that will go to all craft in radio range as well as to any shore station in range. When seconds count, you might not have time to send a manual Mayday. How long does it take you to ascertain your lat / long and unambiguously state the numbers in a message?

The second and more recent development is an electronic device worn on the body that communicates with a control on the motor electronics. If you fall overboard and get more than 20 metres or so from the motor, the device will shut down the motor. You might still have to swim for the boat, but at least it will not be motoring away from you.

Think ahead, act with care, and stay safe on the water. See you at the next club meeting on November 14.

When VHF radio and GPS are connected, flip up the distress cover and hit the button for a fast, automated mayday broadcast giving your latitude and longitude.









Always wear your personal locator beacon at sea and you can count on it being with you if ever you go over the side, or if your boat sinks too fast for you to grab the full size EPIRB.







